New Grant Application and Scoring Process

- \$1,300,438 available for implementation projects
- Partial funding offered
- Online grant application
 - 24 complete applications received
 - Total request amount of \$2,188,683.87
- Two day scoring process by Grant Scoring Subcommittee
 - All applicants provided a 5 minute presentation of their project

Current Challenges with Drug Disposal

 As a temporary measure, since 2010 the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) has annually sponsored only two take-back days per year.

Regional Solutions

- Outreach and education
 - Ongoing efforts through NCTCOG committees (WATER, Solid Waste)
 - Industry (Hospital, substance abuse coalitions, etc.)

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
Regional Drug Take-Back Outreach

- NCTCOG was approached by two cities in our region to manage a proposed Drug Take-Back pilot project
 - Over 25 entities expressed interest in participating
- NCTCOG did not meet deadline for competitive grant application for project funding
- Proper disposal of medications is a cross cutting issue with diverse group of stakeholders including:
 - Police Departments
 - Water Departments
 - Doctors and other Healthcare Professionals
 - Solid Waste/Landfills
 - Pharmacies
- Initial workshop/roundtable discussion as next step

Legislative Items


- EPA proposed rulemaking on reducing emissions from existing municipal waste landfills
 - Link: <u>http://www3.epa.gov/ttn/atw/landfill/landflpg.html</u>
- PATH Act extended tax credits for alternative fuels including compressed natural gas (CNG) through 2016
 - Includes facilities that produce certain renewable resources such as landfills
 - Permanently extends incentives for charitable contributions of "wholesome food" for non-corporate business tax payers

- Deadline to submit proposals to TCEQ for the Study on the Economic Impacts of Recycling was December 18, 2015.

Packaging Recycling Project

- After the June 2015 Texas Packaging Recycling Summit, a planning team was formed consisting of NCTCOG, STAR, EPA, TCEQ, and the Carton Council to address issues surrounding packaging recycling.
- Collaborative process of four work groups to advance packaging recycling:
 - Education/Messaging
 - Existing Policy
 - End markets
 - Infrastructure
- Work groups will convene together as a whole group at the second Packaging Summit to be held in July 2016 to share findings, conclusions and next steps.
