

SUMMARY

Public Education Task Force Wednesday, July 18, 2018 9:30 a.m., Tejas Conference Room NCTCOG Offices, CPIII 600 Six Flags Drive, Arlington, TX 76011

1. Welcome and Introductions.

DISCUSSION

2. **Doo the Right Thing.** NCTCOG staff will update the group on the status of the Doo the Right Thing Calendar Contest.

During the entry period from May 1st - June 30th, NCTCOG received 257 pledges and photos, and 200 of those photos were eligible for the contest. Pledges came from 22 cities. The voting period officially opened on Thursday, July 19th and will be open until August 13th.

3. **Cooperative Purchase.** NCTCOG staff will seek input from the group about Cooperative Purchase items and process for the 2019 cycle.

NCTCOG described the history of the cooperative purchase, possible future directions of this program, and asked the group for input regarding benefits or drawbacks of the program. Possible changes if NCTCOG continues the program include: implementing an online order form, reducing the number of items offered, using generic NCTCOG program artwork (ex: Defend Your Drains, Doo the Right Thing) OR requiring all participants to pay setup fees regardless of whose artwork they use, and ordering sustainably sourced or recyclable products.

Several representatives in the room said that they do not utilize the Cooperative Purchase because they can get competitive prices from other vendors that they frequently work with. By ordering their own products, they have more product choices, more control over the artwork, and are able to order items on their own timeline. To facilitate exploratory cost analysis among participants, NCTCOG will ask the cities who use their own vendors to share their names. NCTCOG will distribute this list to the group so that members can assess the savings they are getting from the Cooperative Program.

Members expressed that a side benefit of the Cooperative Purchase is the opportunity to see what other cities are doing for outreach: what items they're using, how they're branding items, etc. NCTCOG will facilitate this continued exchange of ideas by hosting a "bag day" or "show and tell" at the next meeting where members can share promotional items or ideas with each other.

A final decision about whether to continue this program, and what it will look like if continues, will be made at the October 2018 meeting. NCTCOG will ready itself to act quickly, should the group decide to continue this effort. If the Cooperative Purchase program is discontinued, NCTCOG will propose alternate ways to maximize the staff time saved, based on the needs of the member communities.

4. **SmartScape.** NCTCOG staff asks the group if anyone is interested in Fall Plant Sales and how to best support that effort. NCTCOG will provide outreach resources (articles, calendar, specific web links) for fall gardening/SmartScape activities as the season approaches.

NCTCOG asked the group if anyone is still interested in Plant Sales and asked for reasons that the Plant Sales trailed off. The group almost unanimously stated that the Plant Sales no longer occur due to the difficulty of working with Home Depot, especially given some staff turnover in management of the local stores. NCTCOG asked if the group would be interested in utilizing local nurseries for SmartScape plant sales, with an understanding that these would be individually coordinated events rather than a regional planning effort. Some communities like this idea. Other members expressed concern that they wouldn't be able to do this in an equitable manner because there are many nurseries located in their community.

The group would like NCTCOG to reach out to Native Plant Society of Texas (NPSOT) again and to local Master Gardener groups, to see if SmartScape can piggyback on their events. This might involve having a SmartScape representative at their plant sales or providing stickers to mark SmartScape plants. Members also suggested NCTCOG draft educational materials (such as brochures) to place at stores. It would be difficult to get these materials placed in large corporate stores, but some local nurseries may utilize them. Members also suggested making SmartScape-related events, such as those held by NPSOT, AgriLife, or Master Gardeners, more prominent on the website.

A few cities are planning on holding SmartScape-related events in the upcoming seasons. Keep Burleson Beautiful is hosting a National Planting Day event on September 8th in conjunction with the fall trash pick-up event. Denton and Arlington also expressed interest in holding springtime plant sales.

5. **FY19 Project Topics.** The group will brainstorm topic areas for the FY19 Explainer Video project.

NCTCOG shared examples of videos on its website that are similar in duration and style to the planned FY19 project. NCTCOG informed the group that it has not yet decided whether to use an outside vendor or find a software to do the videos in-house.

The group provided several possible video topics. Overall, the group preferred topics that focus on consequences of citizens' actions, rather than instructions on what to do. Suggested topics included:

- Bacteria levels in water bodies
 - o There is an existing Doo the Right Thing PSA, but it is not focused mainly on bacteria
- Deoxygenation caused by excess organic matter in creeks
 - There is a Yard Waste PSA, but it focuses more on actions homeowners can take instead of consequences of inaction
- Litter, including floatable and cigarette butts
- Pesticides/Fertilizers
- Pool care
- Leaking vehicles

NCTCOG has not determined how many videos its staff will be able to complete for FY19, so the group suggested that a continuation of this effort be an option for the FY20 project. Using a cooperative purchase for ad time on local stations was also suggested as part of a future work program.

OTHER BUSINESS AND ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSION

6. **TMDL Update.** NCTCOG staff will share recent and upcoming activities of the TMDL program.

NCTCOG staff updated the group on recent and upcoming activities of the TMDL program, including the upcoming Texas Stream Team Train-the-Trainer training on Wednesday, July 25th (passed since the writing of this summary) and the Upper Trinity River Basin Coordination Committee Meeting on August 30th.
