

 Application for Grants and Awards



Note: Special district partners should use wastewater ratepayer population. A special district partner with regional systems is considered one entity.

4. Program Outcomes/Successes

- In order to better serve WATER cost-sharing members, NCTCOG is interested in discussing the best way to measure program outcomes and successes with the group.
- Examples:
 - Gallons of grease collected each year (not just during the Holiday Grease Roundup) and associated emissions reductions
 - Social media analytics
 - Trends in Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSOs) over time
 - Amount of wipes and other non-flushables collected at WWTFs
- These metrics would be collected and included in the annual Work Program Summary and could be utilized by NCTCOG/WATER to further the program and make decisions.







Defend Your Drains North Texas

With toilet paper in short supply right now, people are trying to find alternatives to use. Regardless of the option you choose, remember that ONLY toilet paper can be flushed down the drain. If you chose to use baby wipes, fissues, paper towels, "flushable" wipes, rags, or anything else, do NOT flush it down the drain. This can easily cause a backup in your pipes, especially with repeated use. Throw any TP alternative in the trash after






