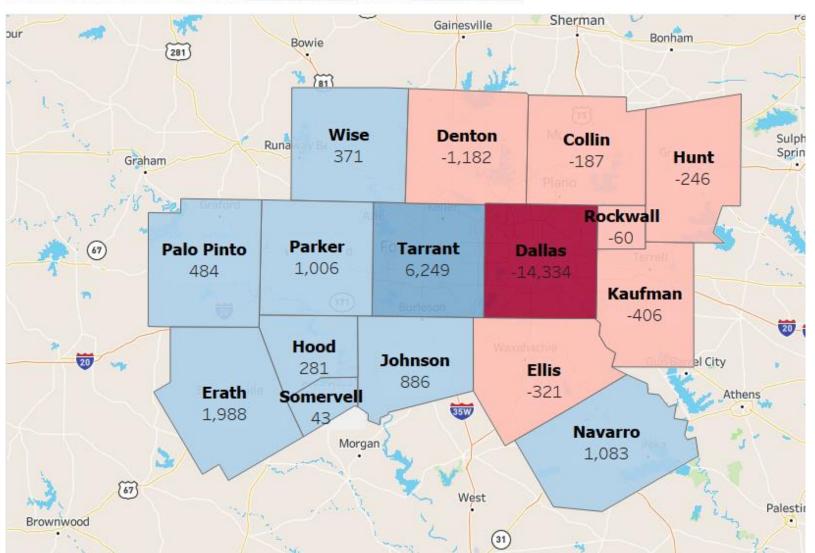
Last Three Years Based on June



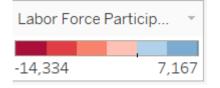

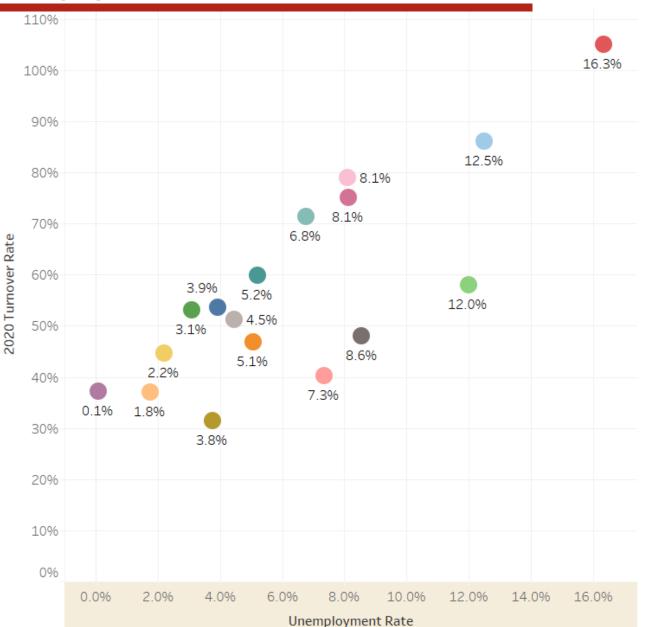

Unemployment Rate & Turnover Rate





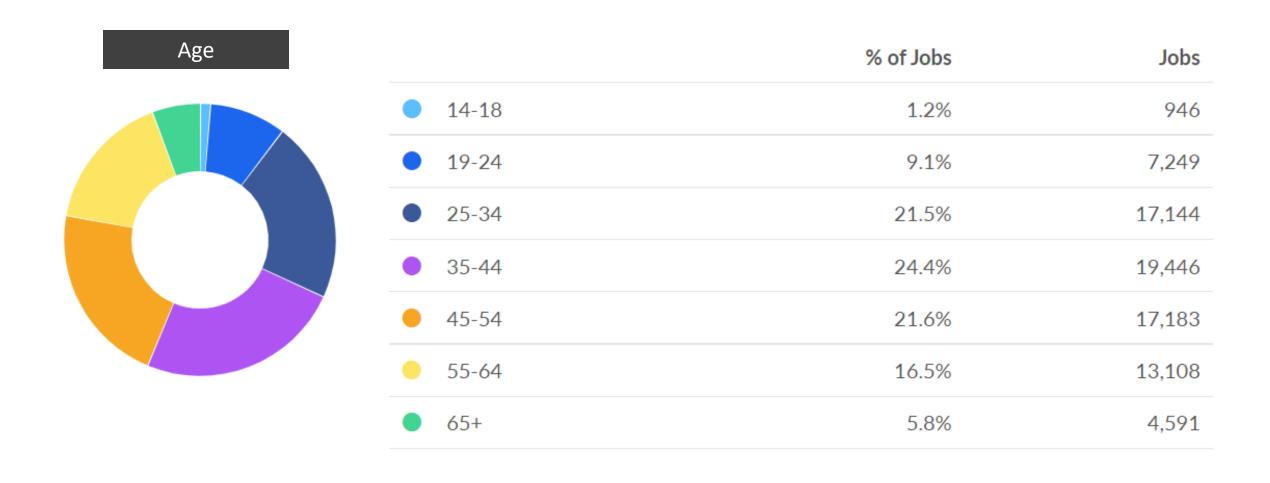

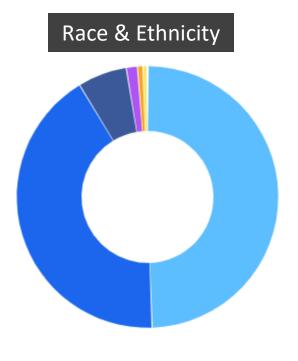

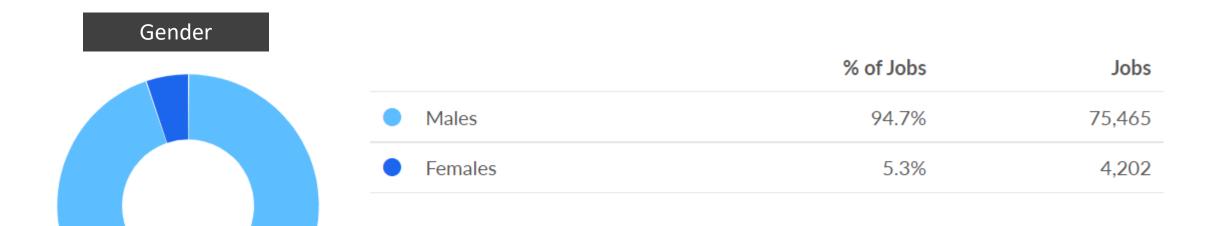

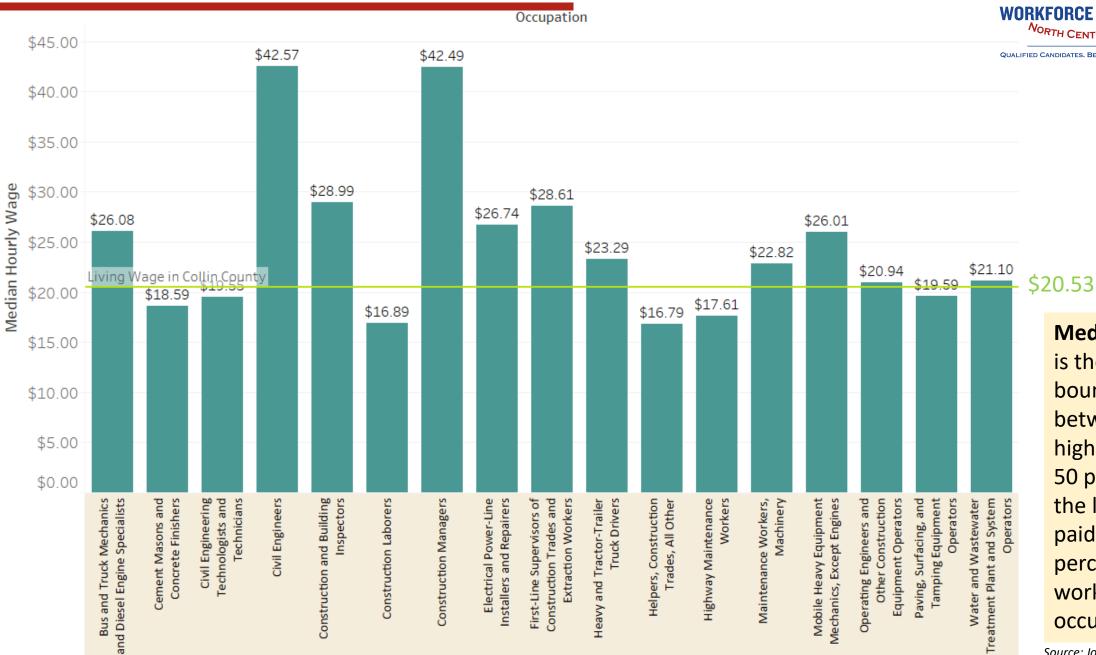

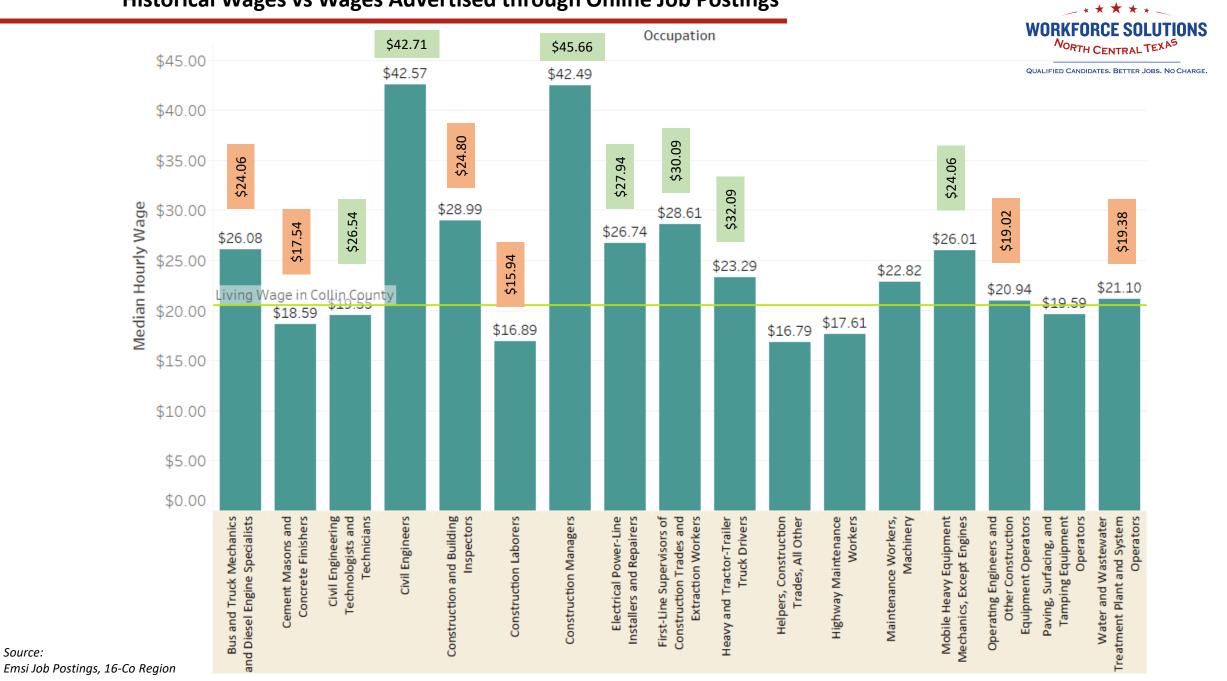

Workforce Trends



- A record 4 million people quit their jobs in April alone, according to the Labor Department
 - Contributing factors:
 - lingering health concerns
 - working mothers staying home to care for children
 - generous unemployment insurance benefits
 - decisions to retire or prioritize other activities
 - greater focus on career paths that offer stable, higher paying jobs
- Monster reports as many as 95% of workers are currently considering changing jobs
- Dallas Federal Reserve reported almost one in four workers fully at Home in February 2021, with a projected 20% increase in remote work by next year
