

3. FY2021 Work Program Priority Task Discussion


- NCTCOG began accepting FY2021 Work Program Commitments on August 5, 2020, and invoices will be sent in October 2020.

3. FY2021 Work Program Priority Task Discussion

- Priority Tasks for FY2021:
 - NCTCOG will not be returning to working in the office full time until at least January 2021, meaning that all staff travel and in-person meetings are suspended until further notice.
 - NCTCOG recognizes that many of WATER's participants may be facing budget constraints that will impact the amount of cost-shares received due to COVID-19. Due to this, NCTCOG would like feedback from participants on the highest priority tasks for FY2021.
 - We will work down the list of priorities as effectively and efficiently as possible, but unless the Work Program is fully funded, it is unlikely that all tasks can be completed.
 - What are the top priorities for FY2021?
 - Online trainings or webinars for free or reduced cost
 - More social media posts, including paid posts
 - More educational explainer videos
 - Additional support for cost-sharing members (ex. meetings or webinars specifically tailored to needs)
 - Holiday Grease Roundup support








Educational Explainer Video Update

Simple Life Cycle of Drinking Water Draft Video Script:

- Do you know where the water from your tap comes from?
- In North Texas, our drinking water is sourced from our local surface waters. This means the water is pulled from lakes, rivers, and streams. Our local water facilities treat this water by removing bacteria and pathogens in order to make our water safe to drink before pumping it into our homes!
- Where does it go after it goes down the drain?
- Once down the drain, water flows to a wastewater treatment plant. Here, it will be cleaned of harmful bacteria and treated. Then, it is released back into our lakes, rivers, and streams!
