**Welcome and Introductions.** NCTCOG will welcome everyone to the meeting.

[Madisson Dunn \(NCTCOG\) welcomed attendees and reviewed housekeeping items.](#)

### PRESENTATION

1. **Beyond Mowing.** Marcie Delgado, President of the Native Plant Society of Texas North Central Chapter, will present on pollinator-friendly plantings in ROW projects, landscaping practices to reduce water and chemical usage, and sustainability issues associated with public works infrastructure.

[Marcie Delgado \(Native Plant Society of Texas\) presented on the opportunity for regionalization of right-of-way \(ROW\) maintenance to align fragmented municipal public works landscapes in North Texas. This opportunity focuses on changing the mindset from reactive maintenance for ROWs to a systems-based approach that optimizes ecological performance. She elaborated that implementing sustainable changes can improve water and stormwater quality/management, climate and air quality, habitat restoration, and promote cost savings in the long run. Marcie shared local examples of operational systems approaches, vegetation-based strategies, and hydrology-based strategies. More information can be found in the \[meeting presentation\]\(#\).](#)

[Madisson Dunn \(NCTCOG\) asked about the public education component with implementing managed meadows and what strategy is the most impactful for addressing pest concerns. Marcie answered that residents cannot pick and choose what is in their habitat, for instance, without snakes, mice will be present. She explained that public animal education is part of habitat management, including explanations on how to cohabitate with wildlife. Tyler Leverenz-Soetaert \(Flower Mound\) added that other municipalities justify that all the critters were already there and now they're just living in these areas instead of resident's yards. Marcie shared that New York City Central Park is amazing, but it's not balanced ecologically as there are no snakes, foxes, coyotes or hawks in the city, allowing the rodents to be unchecked. Those predators have a net benefit on public health. Mary Abercrombie \(McKinney\) stated that sometimes municipal education on best environmental practices supersedes city-wide practices and citizens](#)

often notice this conundrum. Mary asked for ideas or thoughts about when this occurred. Marcie answered that there is often conflicting messaging between what municipalities promote versus approve, especially around data center's water usage recently. She elaborated that given her experience in a small town, municipalities are most approached by developers who have lots of resources. Marcie encouraged municipal workers to invite environmental experts to speak to council so that they are not just hearing from developers. Mary also shared the [City of McKinney's Native Texan Wildlife website](#). She often emphasizes that native wildlife needs the environment to live, not the couch or carpet. Mary also emphasizes that predators are necessary and shared a resource promoting coyotes: [Celebrating America's Song Dog - Project Coyote](#). Marcie added that local governments can request Texas Master Naturalists to provide presentations and resources to councils. She also shared organizations, such as [Texan By Nature](#) and [Texas Children in Nature](#), that can translate ecological impacts to economic benefits. Michelle Villafranca (Fort Worth) thanked Marcie and shared it was an excellent presentation. Ian Seamans (Environment Texas) shared a website to find local Texas Parks and Wildlife Urban Biologist: <https://tpwd.texas.gov/wildlife/wildlife-diversity/urban-wildlife-program/>. Christi Upton (NCTCOG) stated she found the monetary justifications very helpful and asked if that information was for a new installation or a retrofit. Marcie answered she would have to review her research because some examples included both during those studies.

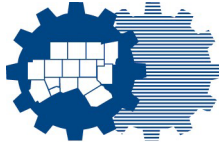
