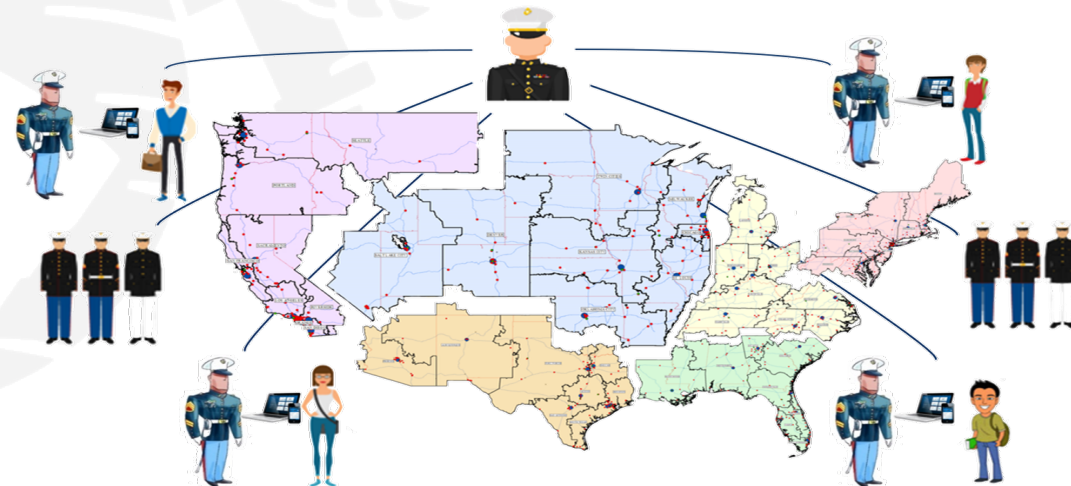


Big Picture: MCRC Mission

Marine Corps Recruiting Command is responsible to the Commandant of the Marine Corps to **recruit** qualified individuals for the active and reserve components, both Officer and Enlisted, to achieve Total Force accession requirements.

Approximate Fiscal Year Mission (Oct-Sep)

- Enlisted: 27,000 (Active) | 4,250 (Reserve)
- Officer: 1,800 (Ground | Air | Law | Res)
- Prior Service: 3,500
- Total: 36,550

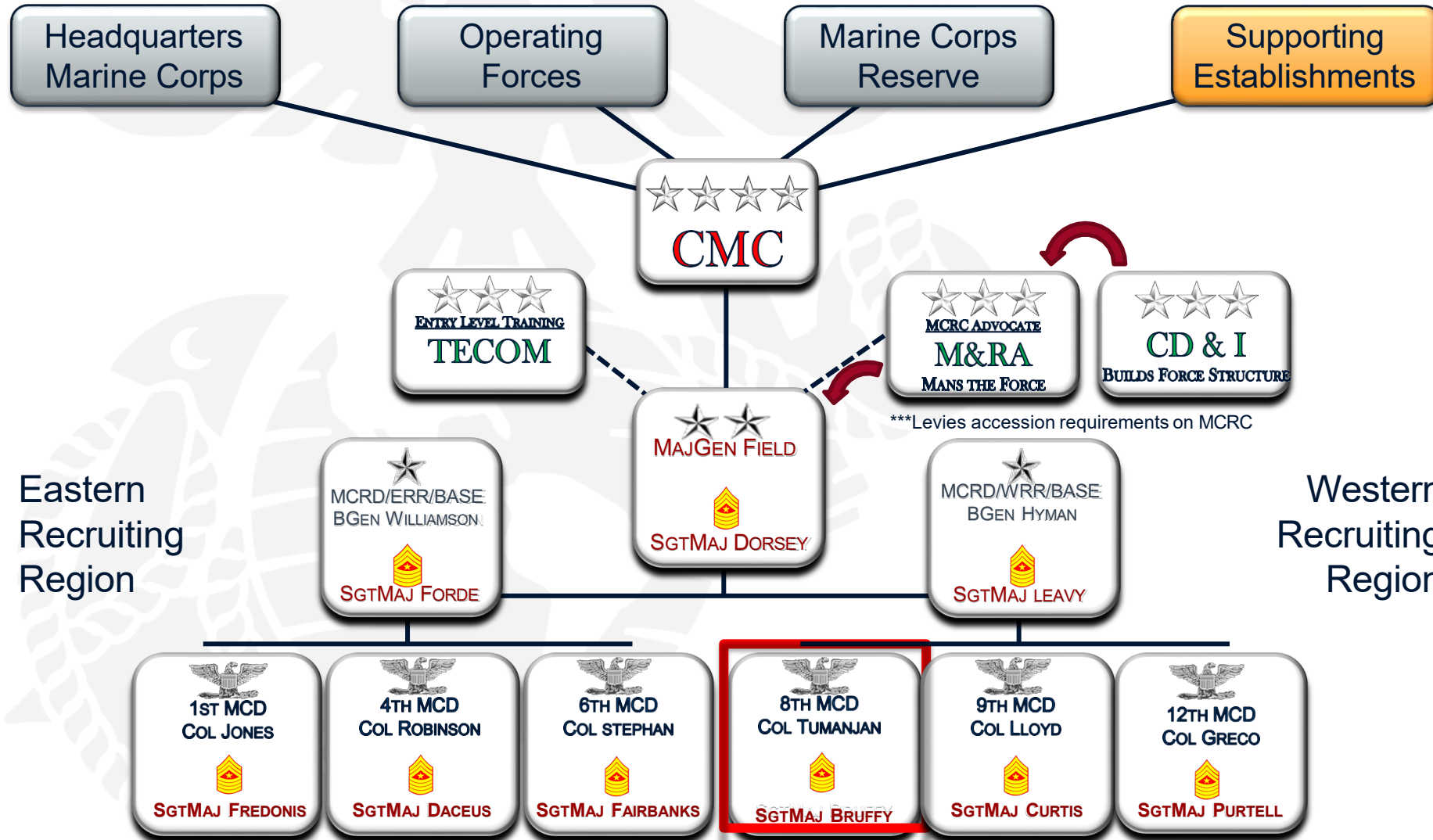

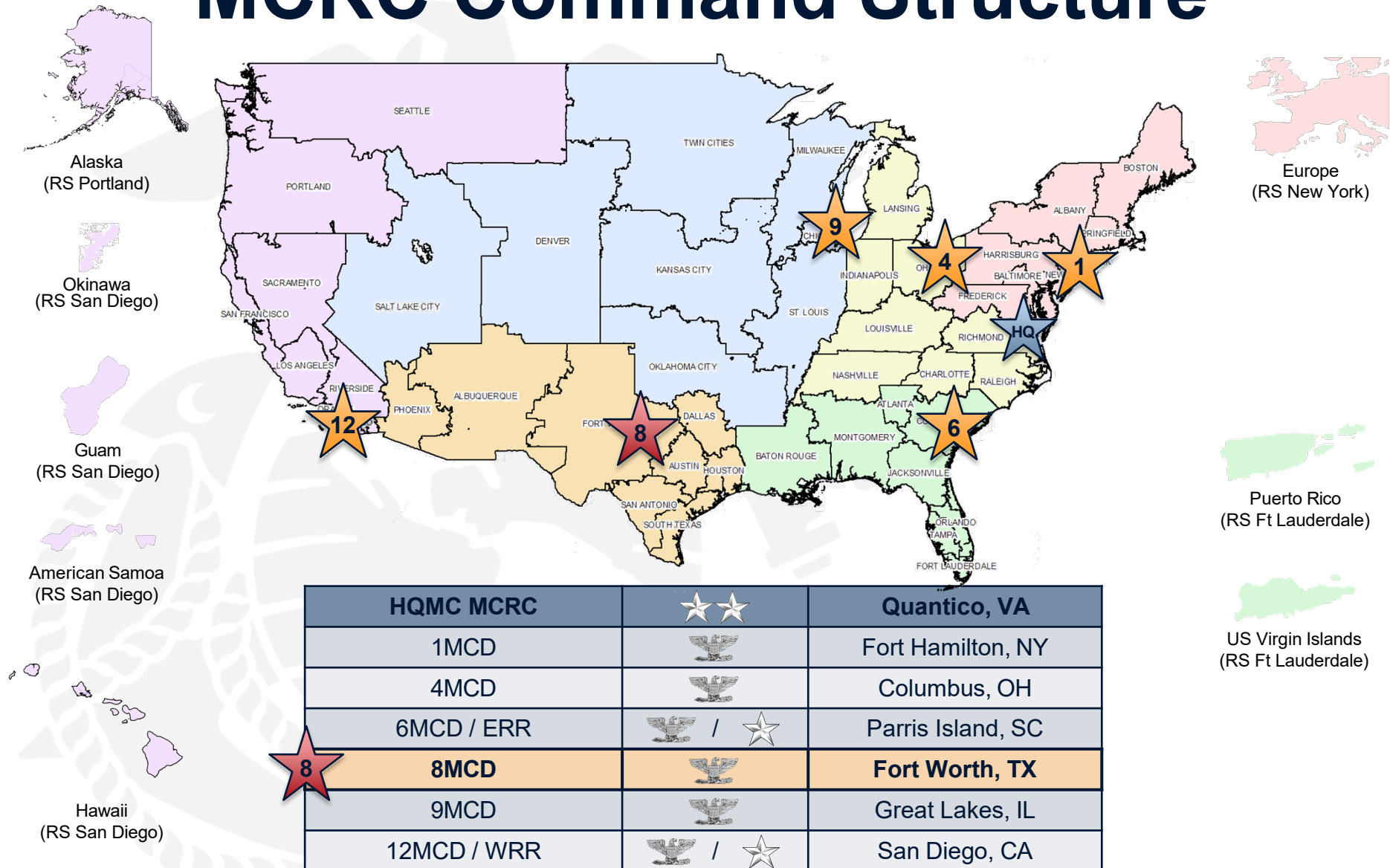


Marine Corps Recruiting Command





MCRC Command Structure



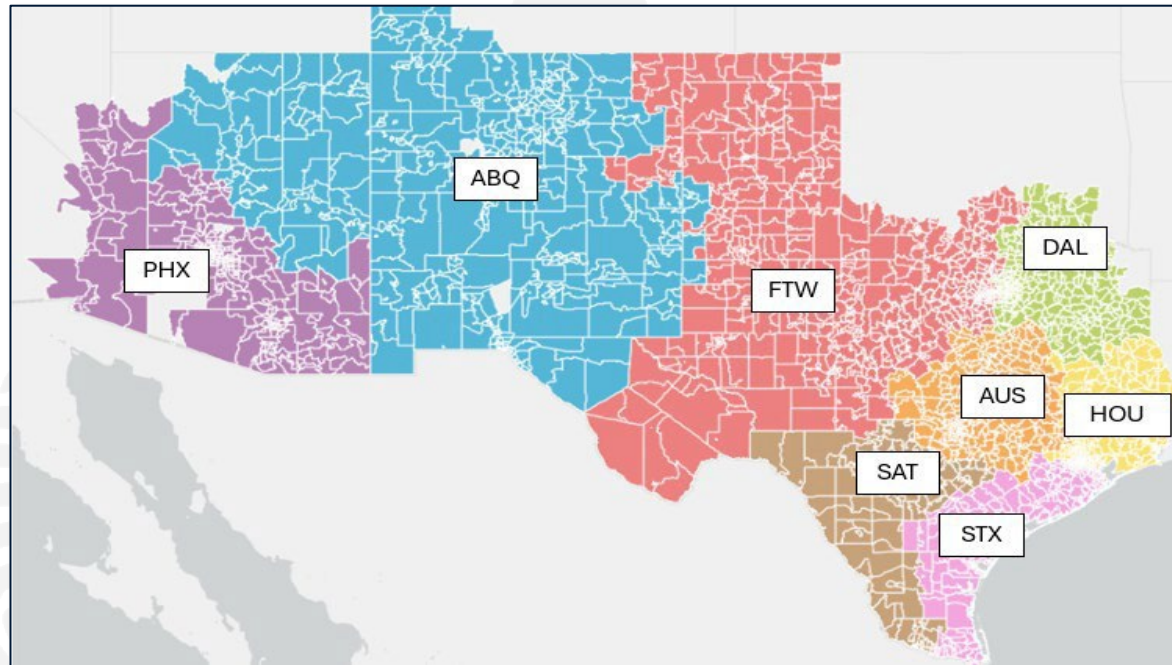

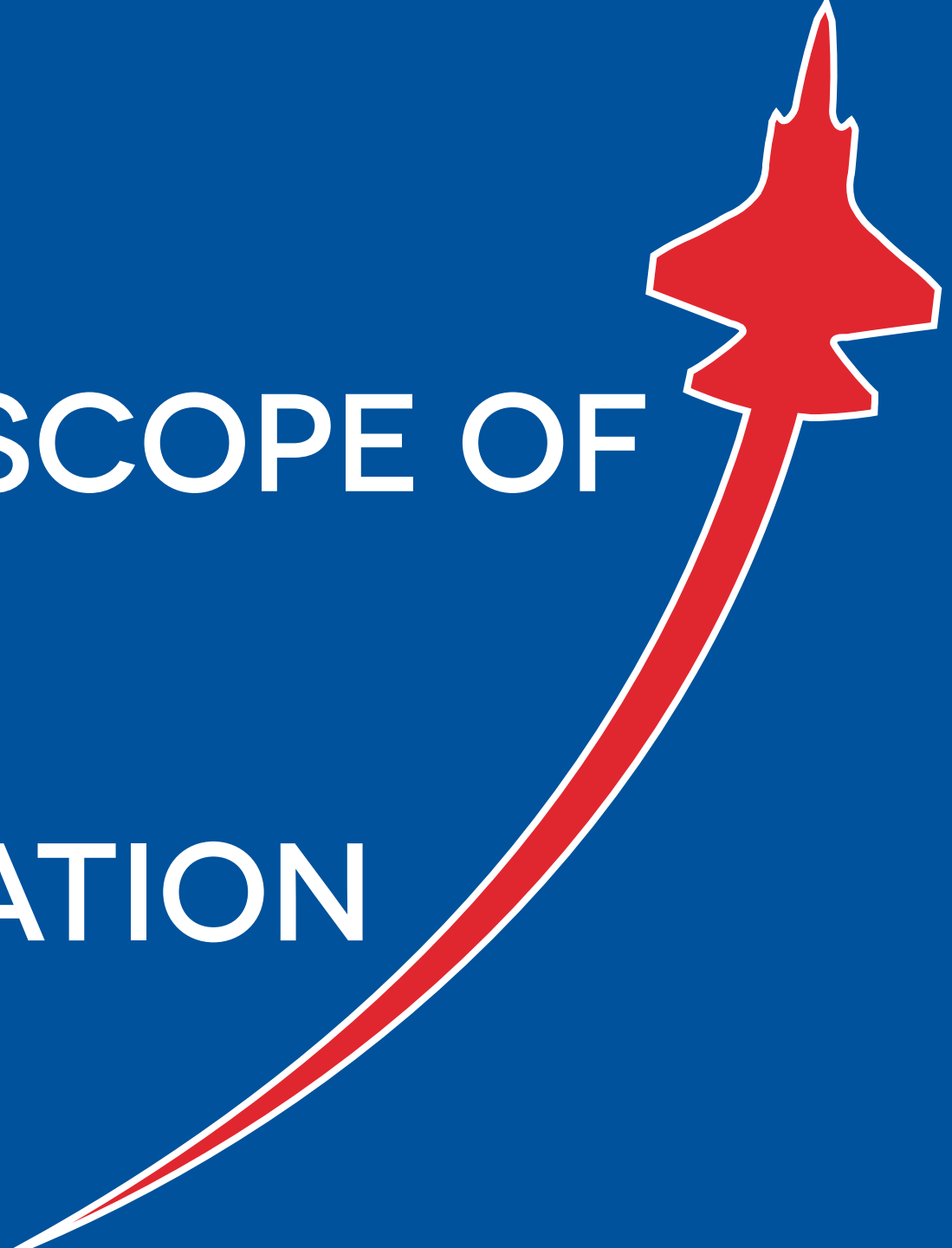

OVERVIEW

- Joining Forces study completed in 2018
- Over 150 strategies identified, both regional and installation-specific
- Initial JLUS Implementation Grant received from Department of Defense, 2020-2024, included 24 high-priority tasks related to Joining Forces recommendations
- Ability to apply for another implementation grant to continue making progress towards the Joining Forces recommendations
- NCTCOG has been encouraged to pair the JLUS Implementation Grant with a Military Installation Readiness (MIR) Study
- OEA Guidance: Need to connect to added value to DoD, no other resources for grant funds being requested, connect back to original JLUS grant issues to be addressed – average amount \$200,000 over 18-24 months (JLUS), \$500,000-550,000 (MIR)

DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK FOR NEXT GRANT

Coordination Between Military and Community

- Maintain inventory of compatibility actions regionwide
- Administer Texas Compatible Use Forum
- Develop and support formal channels of communication and coordination at Fort Wolters

Community-Installation Security Partnerships

- Administer the Defense Community Safety and Security Committee, including implementation of regional security partnerships with communities

DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK FOR NEXT GRANT

Local Planning and Encroachment Protection

- Complete methodology of the Strategic Parcel Acquisition and Reuse Program and pursue strategic parcel intervention
- Develop a master plan for the former Cowtown BBQ site
- Conduct a Dark Skies Initiative to determine needs and make recommendations for city planning and zoning documents
- Identify needed efforts to secure frequency spectrum
- Prepare a list of available infill sites with development or redevelopment potential along with compatibility suggestions
- Identify land near NAS JRB Fort Worth appropriate for mid-range and high-value housing development and determine impediments to such development or infrastructure needs
- Continued coordination on the planned move of the Chinooks from Hensley Field to NAS JRB Fort Worth
- Work with the City of Mineral Wells to develop a plan for the Fort Wolters Industrial Park

DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK FOR NEXT GRANT

Sound Attenuation Measures

- Identify best practices to notify potential residents about noise impacts in the community and implement promising practices near North Texas military installations
- Investigate feasibility of real estate disclosure through Tarrant Appraisal District
- Mapping and analysis of noise to develop potential mitigation efforts to be applied to new development
- Assistance to local governments to implement measures that will improve sound mitigation, including participation in the Community Noise Mitigation Program
- Establish sound mitigation certification program for homebuilders

DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK FOR NEXT GRANT

Infrastructure Improvements

- Support infrastructure improvements and community partnerships
- Conduct Safe Routes to Schools inventory of sidewalks and other infrastructure needs to support walking and bicycling
- Work with communities, Trinity Metro and VIA to determine if Go Zone or ride share options are feasible

Public Information

- Continued distribution of welcome packets

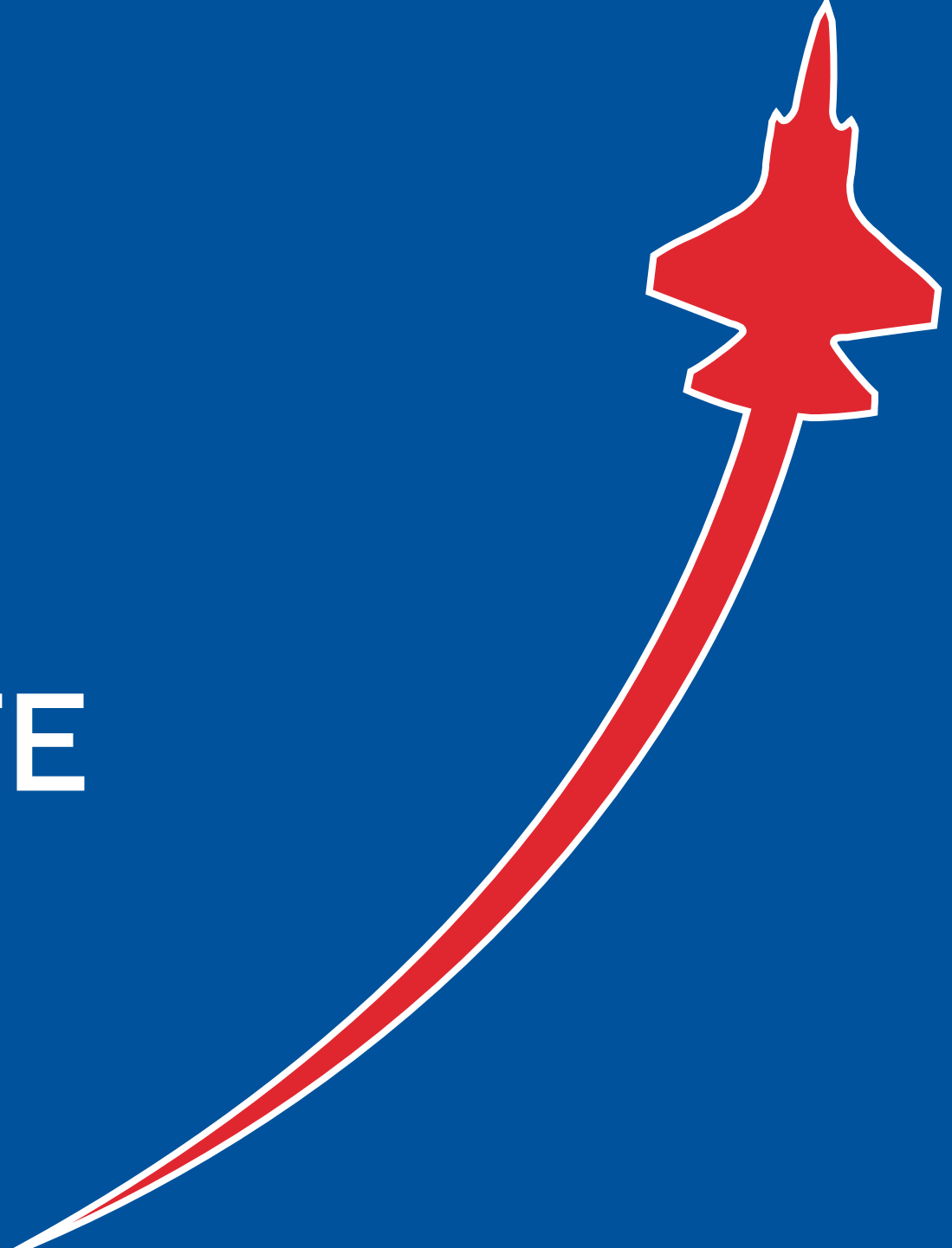
DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK FOR NEXT GRANT

Military Installation Readiness Study

- Identify issues, recommend remedies, prioritize projects, develop cost estimates, and identify potential funding sources at a minimum in the following areas:
 - Stormwater
 - Water Service
 - Energy Service
 - Cyber Security
 - Community Resources (first responders, recreation)
 - Stormwater Debris Mitigation
 - Base Accessibility
 - Transportation Project Construction Traffic Management Plans

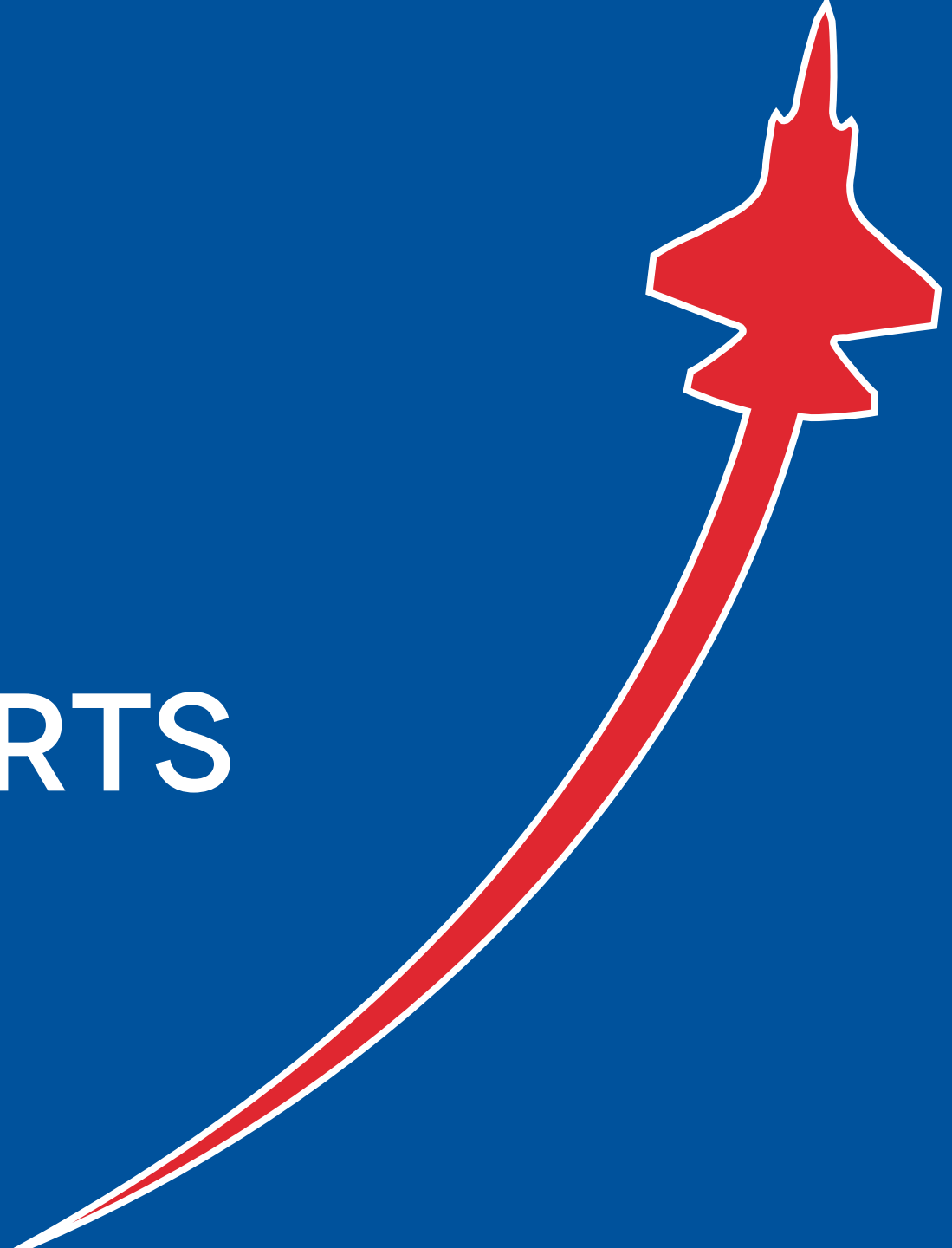

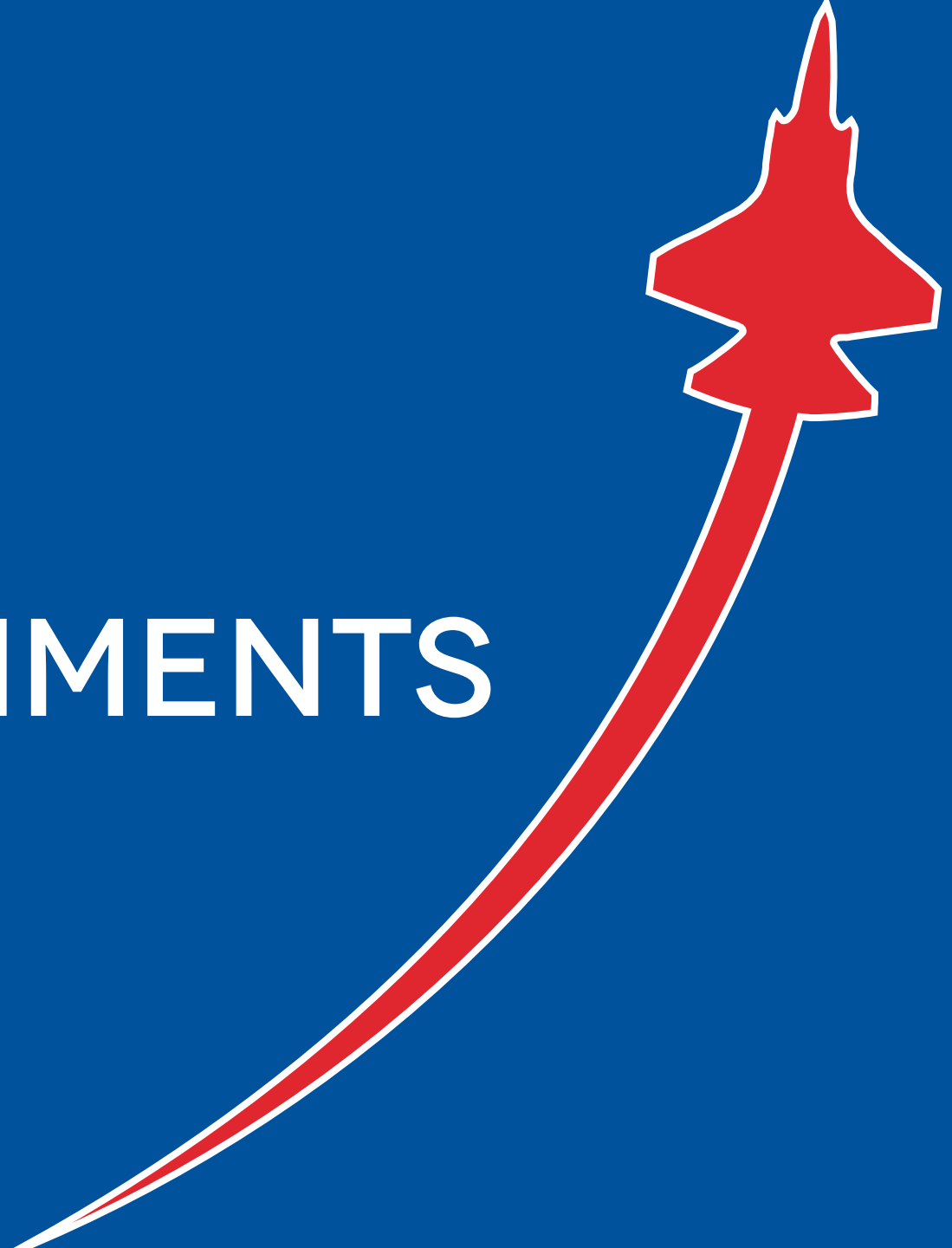
