PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS

Vice President Piel opened the meeting for public comment and asked if there was anyone present wishing to speak. There being no one, he proceeded with the meeting.

Item 1 Approval of Minutes

Vice President Piel stated that the first item on the agenda was approval of the minutes from the January Board meeting.

Upon a Motion by Councilmember Crain (seconded by Judge Sweet), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the minutes of the January Executive Board meeting.

ltem 2 Resolution to Accept and Acknowledge Receipt of the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for Fiscal Year 2021

This item was postponed to the March Executive Board meeting.

Item 3 **Resolution Approving 2045 Demographic Forecasts**

Mark Folden, Senior Predictive Analytics Specialist, requested Board approval for the 2045 Demographic Forecasts. He provided a presentation explaining North Central Texas Council of Governments' (NCTCOG) responsibilities for creating long-range, small-area demographic forecasts for use in infrastructure planning in North Central Texas. He explained that most of the funding comes from NCTCOG's Transportation Department in support of the Mobility 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan and the Air Quality Conformity Analysis. The

development of the forecasts is a joint effort between the Research and Information Services (RIS) and Transportation departments.

Upon a Motion by Judge Jenkins (seconded by Mayor Hairston), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

Item 4 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Document Management Services

Molly Rendon, Director of Administration, requested Board authorization to enter into contract agreements with Armstrong Archives, Corporate Records Management, ManCom, National Records Centers and Neubus for Document Management Services, for a maximum five (5) year terms. The contractual agreements will retain the services of firms providing document storage, document imaging and digitization and/or document destruction services via cooperative contracts allowing entities to maintain and manage their records retention and document maintenance needs. A Request for Proposals, (RFP) #2022-003, was issued, received, and evaluated by the committee awarding the named entities.

Item 5 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Public Sector Procurement Consulting Services

Molly Rendon, Director of Administration, requested Board authorization to enter into contract agreements with Calyptus Consulting Group; Carol Cooper; Charles E. Oberrender; Civic Initiatives, LLC; Periscope Holdings, Inc.; and Simplar Sourcing Solutions LLC for Public Sector Procurement Consulting Services, for a maximum five (5) year terms. The contractual agreements will retain the services of experienced individual consultants and experienced consulting firms that provide Public Sector Procurement Consulting Services via cooperative contracts allowing entities to achieve their procurement objectives by augmenting existing procurement personnel. A Request for Proposals, (RFP) #2021-083, was issued, received, and evaluated by the committee awarding the named entities. The contracts are available through the TXShare cooperative purchasing program.

Item 6 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Early Childhood Education Curriculum for Child Care Services

Phedra Redifer, Director of Workforce Development, requested Board approval to enter contract agreements with Frog Street Press, LLC; Kindermusik International, Inc.; and Teaching Strategies, LLC, for Early Childhood Education curriculum and training for maximum two (2) year terms and in a cumulative amount not to exceed \$500,000. The curriculum selected through designated vendors will provide and enhance instructional support for Early Learning Professionals within these programs and meet specific Texas Rising Star assessment measures for improvement. The selection of vendors was solicited utilizing the Buyboard Proposal Name: Instructional Materials and Classroom Teaching Supplies and Equipment: Proposal Number 653-21.

Item 7 Resolution Authorizing Agreements for the Receipt of Funds for Planning and Implementation Programs from the Texas Department of Transportation

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board approval for the Receipt of Funds for Planning and Implementation Programs from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) of approximately \$16,450,000

(\$6,450,000 STBG + \$5,000,000 Category 10 + \$925,000 RTR local match + \$4,075,000 local match + 1,290,000 in Transportation Development Credits in lieu of match). The programming of funds was approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC). The below table details individual funding agreements.

Upon a Motion by Mayor Hairston (seconded by Judge Sweet), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

Item 8 Resolution Authorizing an Amendment to the Contract with CARMA, Inc. and an Agreement with the Texas Transportation Institute for Auto Occupancy Verification Technology Demonstration Project

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization to amend the contract between NCTCOG and CARMA, Inc. for the implementation of an auto occupancy detection and verification technology demonstration project and increase the not-to-exceed amount by \$2,735,000 (\$2,735,000 Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives) for a total contract not-to-exceed amount of \$22,035,000. He explained the contract with CARMA, Inc. was authorized by the Board in December 2016 as a pilot project contingent upon successful completion and sufficient funding allocated by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) that expanded into the integration phase resulting in an amendment of the contract in January 2019 with a total contract authorization amount not to exceed \$19,300,000. The \$2,735,000 increase in funding will assist in developing an accounting framework that provides high-occupant vehicles financial discounts or rewards along corridors in the DFW region. CARMA is responsible for an in-kind match of \$4,075,000 for the demonstration project.

Additionally, Mr. Morris requested approval to enter an agreement between NCTCOG and the Texas Transportation Institute to evaluate the effectiveness of the CARMA technology demonstration for a not-to-exceed amount of \$810,000 (\$810,000 Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives).

Upon a Motion by Mayor Hairston (seconded by Councilmember Mendelsohn), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

Item 9 Resolution Amending Authorization to Include Tarrant Regional Water District as a Necessary Party to the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Fort Worth Concerning the Trinity River Vision Bridges Project

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization amending the Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with the City of Fort Worth for the repayment of \$5,000,000 related to the Trinity River Vision (TRV) Bridges Project to include Tarrant Regional Water District as a necessary party in the ILA. The TRV Bridges Project includes the construction of three bridges over a proposed new bypass section of the Trinity River in downtown Fort Worth, funded by the United States Army Corps of Engineers. He explained that the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) allocated \$20,000,000 to the City of Fort Worth, of which \$15,000,000 is a grant and \$5,000,000 is to be repaid to the North Central Texas Council of Governments as the RTC's fiscal agent for the funding of the cost increase of the project due to constructability issues and delays. A portion of the payments will be made by the Tarrant Regional Water District.

Item 10 Resolution Authorizing Endorsement of an Application to the State Farm Neighborhood Assist Grant Program

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested endorsement of an application to the State Farm Neighborhood Assist Grant Program funded by the State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company in the amount of \$25,000. The State Farm Neighborhood Assist Grant Program funds activities that address unmet needs in communities State Farm serves. The funding will be used to supplement existing Safe Routes to School planning activities by developing a Safe Routes to School plan for a school in the region that is in an economically disadvantaged neighborhood, with the goal of planning for improvements that would better enable students to safely and comfortably walk or bicycle to school. The grant is funded at 100 percent; therefore, no local match is required.

Item 11 Resolution Authorizing Assignment of Agreement Concerning IH 30 Frontage Road Improvements in the City of Dallas

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization assignment of an agreement concerning the IH 30 Frontage Road Improvements in the City of Dallas. He explained that the Board authorized an agreement with SLF III – The Canyon TIF, L.P., (Stratford Land) in 2012 for receipt of \$3,000,000 in funds over a ten-year period through a combination of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) revenues and developer funds related to the construction of IH 30 frontage roads west of Westmoreland in the City of Dallas. Annual payments of \$300,000, received by the developer, are passed through to the City of Dallas in support of the Dallas Streetcar Project for which North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) serves as the federal grantee. To date, NCTCOG has received \$2,400,000, which has been provided to the City of Dallas, leaving \$600,000 to be paid in the future. Stratford Land is transferring its holdings and has requested NCTCOG consent to assignment of its obligations to LMC Canyon Holdings LLC, which has indicated its commitment to fully comply with the terms of original agreement.

Item 12 Resolution Authorizing Purchase and Placement of Education Campaigns for Transportation Initiatives: Phase 1 – Notifications for Public Input/Meetings

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization for the Purchase and Placement of Education Campaigns for Transportation Initiatives: Phase 1 – Notifications for Public Input/Meetings in an amount up to \$85,000. The combination of education campaign efforts has increased website traffic, greater public participation, lowered costs, and streamlined efficiencies with media outlets such as improved staff coordination and timeliness. Phase I will focus on print publications and digital placements, social media, radio and TV, and transportation displays in multiple languages, when appropriate, to provide reasonable opportunities for the public to learn about and comment on the region's transportation plans in accordance with requirements of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. This effort will be funded with \$85,000 of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds, Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) funds, Transportation Planning Funds (TPF), and RTC Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in lieu of cash match and has been approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC). Other phases will be brought to the Executive Board in the future.

Item 13 Resolution Accepting the Report from Whitley Penn, LLP, for the Transportation Department's Agreed Upon Procedures

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board acceptance of the Report from Whitley Penn, LLP, for the Transportation Department's Agreed Upon Procedures. A review of Transportation Department consultant and subgrantee contracts in excess of \$250,000 for FY 2020 was conducted by Whitley Penn, LLP to determine compliance with the department's contracting procedures. A total of nine contracts were selected for review that were funded through agreements with TxDOT and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Out of seven procedural areas for the basis of the review, the seventh procedural area, verification of timely payment, identified one voucher that was not paid timely. There were no other exceptions found. The satisfactory results and assurances of the appropriate management oversight have been applied to the payment review process to support compliance with prompt payment requirements.

The current contract with Swagit Productions, LLC was authorized by the NCTCOG Executive Board in February 2018, in an amount not to exceed \$61,000 over a five-year period and included the purchase of equipment and services. These services are utilized for various regularly scheduled meetings held by NCTCOG, including meetings of the Executive Board, Regional Transportation Council, and the Workforce Development Board. The need to host multiple meetings off-site from the NCTCOG headquarters in the past at additional costs and potentially in the future has resulted in the need for increased funding to support the video streaming services through the remainder of the five-year contract period (through April 3, 2023).

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Agreements with Recipients for the North Texas Clean

Diesel Project 2021 Call for Projects

The Regional Transportation Council (RTC) opened the North Texas Clean Diesel Project (NTCDP) 2021 Call for Projects (CFP) on October 14, 2021. This initiative is funded from approximately \$1.5 million previously awarded from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) National Clean Diesel Funding Assistance Program to reduce emissions of ozone-forming nitrogen oxides from diesel-powered heavy-duty vehicles or equipment in the Dallas-Fort Worth 10-county ozone nonattainment area by replacing older, high-emitting vehicles, engines, or equipment with new, low-emitting vehicles, engines, or equipment, as well as installing locomotive idle-reduction technology and related infrastructure.

Eligible applicants of NTCDP include private companies and public entities such as local governments who own heavy-duty diesel vehicles or equipment operating in the nonattainment area and who have adopted the RTC Clean Fleet Policy. A list of entities who have adopted the RTC Clean Fleet Policy is available at www.nctcoq.org/fleetpolicy.

The latest application period ended on January 14, 2022. Based on applications and available NTCDP funding, eligible projects were received from the City of Plano, Kenan Advantage Group, and Paccar Leasing Company. Staff recommends a rebate award to City of Plano to replace one diesel vehicle with a newer, zero-emission vehicle. Staff recommends a rebate award for Kenan Advantage Group to replace two diesel vehicles with newer, zero-emission vehicles. Staff recommends a rebate award for Paccar Leasing Company to replace two diesel vehicles with newer, zero-emission vehicles. City of Plano, Kenan Advantage Group, and Paccar Leasing Company will each provide a local contribution of at least 55 percent of the project cost as required by the EPA for replacement projects. The RTC approved funding for these CFP recommendations at its March 10, 2022, meeting. A balance of approximately \$580,000 remains for the NTCDP and will be made available through continuing funding opportunities.

Event

The Regional Transportation Council has a funding program that helps pay for needed support for special events within the Dallas-Fort Worth region. The WrestleMania event organizers requested the region provide Trinity Railway Express (TRE) service on Saturday, April 2, 2022, and Sunday, April 3, 2022, to provide fans with an option to ride transit to and from the event. The WrestleMania event organizers will provide the shuttle bus service from the CentrePort Station to AT&T Stadium for both days.

The North Central Texas Council of Governments has coordinated with Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) and Trinity Metro, to provide TRE service as well as emergency shuttle buses, if needed for this event. Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds and Regional Transportation Council Transportation Development Credits in lieu of local match will be used to pay the cost of WrestleMania fans riding the TRE on Saturday, April 2, and for the TRE service on Sunday, April 3, as well as two (2) buses each from DART and Trinity Metro in case additional buses are needed to transport fans. Eight statements of qualifications were received in response to the RFQ. The Selection Committee met on February 23, 2022, to review and evaluate responses. The Selection Committee is recommending awards to all eight of the individuals who responded to the RFQ, in a total amount not to exceed \$50,000 in Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program funds. Regional Transportation Development Credits will be used in lieu of local match.

A draft resolution authorizing NCTCOG to enter into contracts with instructors for the TIM Training Program, for an amount not to exceed \$50,000, is attached for Executive Board consideration. Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Interlocal Agreement for Landbanking to Support

Critical Regional Infrastructure

On March 10, 2022, the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) approved RTC Local funds in the amount of \$2.7 million for landbanking to support critical regional infrastructure. These funds supplement RTC's long-standing Landbanking Program. The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Executive Board serves as RTC's fiduciary agent for these funds.

The RTC works through local governments to implement the Program. The RTC authorizes funding for local governments to acquire parcels. The mechanism by which local governments are reimbursed for such activities is through an Interlocal Agreement between NCTCOG, serving as RTC's fiduciary agent, and the local government. Revenues generated from banked parcels (e.g., leasing for public/private sector use) are returned to NCTCOG, on behalf of the RTC, based on a negotiated split with the local government. There may be opportunities to seek grant funding to offset RTC and local government costs. Any revenues returned to NCTCOG, on behalf of the RTC, are dedicated to the RTC Landbanking Program. There is a current strategic opportunity to work with the City of White Settlement to implement elements of the RTC's Landbanking Program to support critical regional infrastructure. Additional information is attached.

A draft resolution authorizing an Interlocal Agreement with the City of White Settlement along with fiduciary responsibilities to support critical regional infrastructure is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and will be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.



Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Aging Contracts with In-Home Service Providers

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), in its capacity as the designated Area Agency on Aging (AAA), receives Title III-B funding through the Older Americans Act, a portion of which must be used to purchase in-home services for frail older adults. Specific in-home services funded by the AAA are homemaker, personal assistance, and agency-managed respite.

NCTCOG has had contracts with six in-home service providers, and one recently expired. The other five agencies are unable to meet clients' needs, resulting in delayed or deferred services.

In February 2022, NCTCOG initiated a competitive procurement for in-home services and received six applications in response. Following evaluation, the review committee recommends that contracts be extended to all applicants.

Under the contracts, in-home service providers are reimbursed on a unit rate basis for actual services rendered. Pending Board approval, in-home service contracts will be in effect from April 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023, with the option to issue up to two one-year extensions.

With this as background, staff recommends Board authorization to contract with 2Gether Resources Group, Desert Sky Holdings, J & L Innovations, K J Quality Care, Koroheke Care, and Supportive In Home Care for in-home services to address the needs of frail older adults and their family caregivers.

A draft resolution authorizing contracts for in-home services with the aforementioned providers, for maximum forty-two (42) month terms and in a cumulative amount not to exceed \$800,000 is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation and be available to respond to questions prior to seeking Board approval.

 - vi. Special Districts
 - vii. Academia
 - viii. CASA Staff Non-voting
 - ix. NCTCOG Staff Non-voting

IV. Council Member Attendance

- a. Council members are encouraged to attend all meetings or designate an alternate

- c. If a member does not attend at least 2 meetings a year in person formal written communication will be sent to that member to determine if there is still interest in remaining on the Council and reminding the member of the requirement to attend 2 meetings in person.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Submission of the North Central Texas Region's 2021-2026

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS) to the U.S. Department

of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA)

The North Central Texas Economic Development District is required to update and submit a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS) to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) every five years. The CEDS is a central component of the requirement for Economic Development District designation and retention.

The purpose of the CEDS is to outline economic development guidelines, goals and initiatives that build on the region's assets, improve opportunities, and minimize threats so the region is globally competitive for economic development opportunities and able to recover from economic shocks. Broad-based economic development goals and initiatives are identified within the document. A federally approved CEDS is required for cities, counties, special districts, and non-profits across the region to pursue federal funding opportunities for EDA grant programs. EDA requires that funding applications align with a local or regional economic development strategy.

Work on the updated CEDS commenced in March 2021, with more than 167 regional economic development stakeholders, including economic development corporations, local government professionals, elected officials, chambers of commerce, non-profit leaders, educational and workforce sectors, and private sector individuals with economic development interests. These regional stakeholders were divided into eight geographic clusters representing common regional locations and two industry clusters - the University cluster and the Workforce cluster. Each clusters met to conduct SWOT analyses of their areas and profession. Twenty-two meetings were held over four months.

In addition to the SWOT analyses, an industry survey was sent to public and private sector stakeholders and partners to determine the core economic development priorities of focus for the CEDS. The survey was made available for three months (August – October). The core areas identified in the survey included Economy, Quality of Life, Community Services and Infrastructure, and Healthcare and Social Services. The 2021 – 2026 Draft CEDS is the result of that work.

The Draft has been posted on the NCTCOG website for comments and input for more than 30 days. Additionally, links to the draft document, an input form and an invitation to review and comment were made available through media release and distribution list notifications. - 10 representatives from principal economic interest (Chambers, EDCs, Post-Secondary Institutions, Workforce Development Groups, and/or Labor Groups)

Each Board member serves a term of three years and may not serve more than three consecutive threeyear terms, so long as they continue to meet qualifications for the category they represent.

- Additional persons may serve as ex-officio members because of their special knowledge or experience with aging matters. These resource members may include representatives from the Veterans Administration, State Citizen Advisory Council, and the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature.
