

Public Input Summary

November 2023-December 2024

An analysis of 3,570 open-ended survey comments and 508 Map Your Experience entries revealed three main concerns.





Roadway congestion and commute times



Rising demand for expanded public transportation

Integrating Your Input

Mobility 2050 will address cyclists and pedestrian's safety concerns through policy and action plans.

- The Pedestrian Safety Action Plan identifies priority corridors based on crash data and collaborates with regional, state, and federal partners to reduce pedestrian injuries and fatalities.
- 6,770 out of the 9,540 existing, funded and planned miles of the Regional Combined Active Transportation Network are off-street paths.
- The Mobility Plan emphasizes safety and well-connected facilities as key criterion for funding projects.





Roadway and Transit

- NCTCOG continues to work on Transit 2.0, a strategic initiative to reimagine public transit in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. Policy direction and recommendations are concluding and will be integrated into Mobility 2050.
- Roadway recommendations are majority carry over projects from previous plans and asset optimization in areas lacking right-of-way.
- Solutions on addressing public needs regarding these will be covered in upcoming public meetings.
