




Poll Question #2






Tarrant County by the Numbers Population Growth






Tarrant County by the Numbers Race + Ethnicity






Tarrant County by the Numbers Journey to Work





Tarrant County by the Numbers Poverty




■ Above 1.5x Poverty Line

■ Below Poverty Line




Tarrant County by the Numbers Home Ownership


