

<u>HB 1370</u>	Rep. Raymond	Relates to an exemption from ad valorem taxation of the amount of the appraised value of real property that arises from the use of xeriscape on the property.	Filed 11/18/24
<u>HB 1904</u>	Rep. Canales	Relating to the release of ballons and associated littering; creating a criminal offense.	Filed 1/16/25





OTHER COG PROGRAMS AND UPDATES

TURN OFF THE FAUCET

 Turn off the faucet while washing your hands. This can save about two gallons of water per minute!

WATER REUSE

- Don't let your water go to waste! Find another use for excess/leftover water instead of putting it down the drain!
- Don't let your water go to waste! Use leftover drinking water or ice to water indoor plants or asking your coworkers if they have a use for it.

USE CASE: KITCHEN, REC CENTER, LIBRARY






FILL THE (DISH)WASHER

- Be mindful to run the (dish)washer only when full to conserve water whenever possible.
- Using a full dishwasher is more water efficient than washing by hand!
- Running full loads in the (dish)washer is both a water and energy wise choice!

REUSABLE WATER BOTTLES

- Consider using reusable bottles to reduce waste!
- Reusable bottles use fewer water and energy resources.

WATCH OUT FOR LEAKS!

Watch for signs of water leakage and report any concerns or issues you see! The sooner a leak is noticed and reported, the sooner it can be fixed.

Fixing indoor/outdoor leaks can save # gallons of water per day.

USE CASE: KITCHEN, RESTROOM, OUTDOOR IRRIGATION

Check the water level in your toilet tank. Be sure that the level is 1" below the top of the tank.

Check behind or below your washing machine or dishwasher for stains indicating a leak. Check for and replace worn gaskets and washers on indoor and outdoor faucets. Check sprinkler systems and check your yard for wet spots.



SWEEP!

- Instead of using water for cleaning tasks, consider using alternative tools as appropriate!
- Choose to sweep sidewalks and floors instead of pressure washing them.
- Using a broom can save 8-18 gallons of water per minute!

IRRIGATION

- What's the weather today? Don't run irrigation in the rain or freezing temperatures.
- To limit water loss from evaporation, run irrigation before 10 am or after 8 pm.
- Properly maintaining sprinkler heads and irrigation systems conserves both water and energy resources!

USE CASE: MAINTENANCE SHOP/YARD

SPRINKLER & IRRIGATION BEST PRACTICES

It's just dirt, right?

Follow these watering and irrigation best practices to help prevent runoff of soil, pesticides, and fertilizers.

- Maintain sprinkler heads and irrigation systems to prevent unnecessary water loss.
- Don't water in the rain or freezing temperatures.
- Water at the right time of day.
- Refer to the label for pesticides and fertilizers to make sure you are applying them correctly and watering at the right time.

Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE)

- Next Meeting April 15, 2025, information to be posted online.

Regional Wet Weather Characterization Program (RWWCP)

- NCTCOG staff is coordinating with TCEQ on the continuation of the program into a new monitoring term.
- NCTCOG submitted the new term proposal in January 2024. TCEQ has confirmed receipt of proposal in October 2024. NCTCOG is awaiting TCEQ review before procurement can proceed.

WQMP/WRC UPDATE

Water Resources Council (WRC):

- Developing regional education for Homeowner Associations promoting conservative irrigation practices.
 - Encourage more blue/green infrastructure and less water-intensive landscaping requirement/enforcement.
- Current messaging: reduce irrigation once turf is established and encourage suspending of fines for discolored turf when city is under a water restriction order.

Public Policy and Planning
