### Bernard Jackson, Dallas Area Rapid Transit

Bernard Jackson joined Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) as Chief Operations Officer on May 23, 2022. In that short time, he revitalized the Agency's Operations Teams, including Bus, Light Rail, Facilities Maintenance, GoLink and Mobility Management. After leading an aggressive hiring

campaign for bus and rail operators, Bernard oversaw the hiring of numerous new operators, with many more operators in training. These improvements allowed DART to return major bus routes to the more frequent schedules, originally introduced in January 2022, on Monday, December 12, 2022. The remaining bus routes reduced due to operator shortages were reinstated January 23, 2023. As Bernard likes to say, "DART is back, baby!" Jackson brings over 30 years of transit operations experience to DART, including stints with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority and the Chicago Transit Authority. Jackson's extensive list of distinctions includes the Eno Transit Senior Executive Program and a Bachelor's degree in Sociology from Loyola University in Chicago.

## DART Launches Redesigned Website

DART recently launched a redesigned website which provides riders with a user-friendly experience and new trip planning capabilities. The new website features real-time trip planning with GoLink integration through an upgraded trip planner tool which replicates the results of the GoPass app. It also provides consistent multilanguage translation using Google Translate, which allows visitors to convert text to one for 14 languages. # Dallas-Fort Worth High-Speed Rail Begins Environmental Study

After over 180 meetings between the public, federal, state, and local agencies, elected officials, and community organizations, the North Central Texas Council of Governments is starting an environmental study of high-speed rail between Dallas and Fort Worth. The rail would run along Interstate 30 with three stations, downtown Fort Worth, Arlington's entertainment district, and Downtown Dallas, providing much needed connections. ## DART and DCTA Approve Joint Rail Operations Facility

Last fall, DART and DCTA approved an agreement for a Joint Rail Operations Facility for testing, operations, and maintenance of the new Stadler Fast Light Intercity and Regional Train commuter rail vehicles for the Silver Line regional rail project under construction. The facility in Lewisville will expand DCTA's existing A-train Operations and Maintenance Facility. By developing this facility, the two agencies continue to demonstrate regional benefits of strong cooperative relationships.

### 2020 Census Data on Urban Areas Released

In late December, the Census Bureau released a list of updated Urban Areas (no longer Urbanized Areas). The Census Bureau also released a series of maps, shapefiles and geodatabases with the updated Urban Areas.

There are several differences between the Final 2020 Census Urban Area Criteria and those from 2010. Key differences include the simplification of urban areas by considering all areas with a minimum threshold of 2,000 housing units or 5,000 people being designated as "urban area(s)".

These updates will impact transit providers and partners throughout the region greatly. NCTCOG and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) are working to determine the full impact of these changes. One of the biggest changes is that the former McKinney UZA now includes Frisco, which will change the way funding is allocated and provided to the area.

## Bipartisan Infrastructure Law PTASP Requirements

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law added new requirements to Public Transportation Agency Safety Plans including:

- Safety committees with an equal number of management and frontline staff
- Risk reduction targets and performance measures
- Inclusion of maintenance staff in safety trainings
- De-escalation training requirements

NCTCOG's three transit studies are going strong and will bring needed clarity on the needs and opportunities for enhanced transit in the region.

NCTCOG's transit study for Eastern Dallas, Kaufman, and Rockwall Counties is still in progress. The study will help to develop comprehensive transit planning and implementation plans for the area.

The Denton County transit study will help to identify transit options, funding and implementation strategies, governance structure and the institutional delivery approach of recommended services or projects, and potential impacts on the community.

The Intermodal Transportation Hubs for Colleges and Universities study will help ensure that multimodal needs in and around college campuses are met and mobility options are integrated.

The Denton County transit study and the Intermodal Transportation Hubs for Colleges and Universities study are expected to be completed in Spring 2023.
